

“Horticultural Passions:

Beautiful & Intriguing Plants from My Past, Present, & Future”

Martin Grantham, Greenhouse Manager for San Francisco State’s Biology Department, will share his photographs and growing experience of any number of his more accessible (and a few of his more obscure) plant obsessions from cheilanthoid ferns to conifers, magnolia to *Rhododendron*, *Lapageria* to evergreen climbing *Hydrangea* and restios. When possible, habitat will be contrasted with horticultural tolerances. Propagation and growing tips as well as some initial hybridization results will be given.

“Understanding Color: The Impact of Blue in the Garden” Presented by Robin Parer

The color blue is a powerful tool in a gardener’s repertoire. Color can be used in garden planting schemes to suggest temperature, light and mood. Color can unify or provide a discordant note. Blue has many moods and many uses. Many gardeners love blue flowers, and use them in their gardens in some very revealing ways. We don’t need to limit ourselves to blue flowers. There are blue leaves, blue garden artifacts, and borrowed blue atmosphere effects. We will examine how our eyes see blue and how we can use the color to bring depth, mystery and enchantment into our gardens.

February Plant Forum

"A picture is a worth a thousand words." Fully believing the old adage, color photos of the following plant are available on our website at www.calhortsociety.org in the 'Plant Forum' section.

1. *Helleborus orientalis* - Lenten Rose

RANUNCULACEAE

Frederick Coe, Ross

Fred brought two color forms, both blooming in 1 gallon pots. The darker one, a dusky purple-black was much admired. It had been purchased at a Seattle flower show from a grower on Vashon Island. *Helleborus orientalis* is long-lived in part-shade with moderate water and will self sow. The species is native to Turkey and The Caucasus.

2. *Anapalina caffra*

IRIDACEAE

David Feix, Berkeley

This elegant, red-flowered South African bulb was flowering freely in a 1 gallon pot. Originally obtained from Martin Grantham, who had expressed some concern about its potential invasiveness, it is fortunate that this plant seems to thrive in containers. For David, it can flower over a four-month period.

3. *Bryophytum* (formerly *Kalanchoe*) *tubiflora*

CRASSULACEAE

David Feix, Berkeley

So-called "Mother-of-Thousands", this succulent has taupe-colored leaves with darker spots and clusters of pendulous coral-colored flowers. The leaf margins produce small plantlets which, once detached, can grow into new plants. It is long-flowering, requires little water and is hardy out of doors in Berkeley.

4. *Leucadendron gaplinii*

PROTEACEAE

David Feix, Berkeley

Growing upright to 4 ft wide and ca. 5 ft tall, this South African shrub boasts grey-green narrow leaves and cone like, silvery flower heads on the female form available in the trade. Requiring good drainage, full sun and moderate to occasional water, this genus shares the characteristic family trait of phosphorus intolerance. Hardy to 20-25°.

5. *Leucadendron* x 'Wilson's Wonder'

PROTEACEAE

David Feix, Berkeley

This selection is larger, wider and looser-growing than the species described above. Foliage is larger and greener, somewhat reminiscent of that of bottlebrush, and the male flower cones of this clone are surrounded by a ring of bright light yellow to slightly orangish bracts, particularly colorful in winter and early spring and useful for cutting. Ultimately to 5 ft x 6 ft.

6. *Isopogon formosus*

PROTEACEAE

David Feix, Berkeley

Related to the aforementioned *Leucadendrons*, this shrub hails from Western Australia, and in its divided foliage resembles some members of another related genus,

Grevillea. The cone-like flower-heads are bright pink, the open flowers protruding in a pin-wheel like ring, and are freely-born in the spring. Grows upright to 6 ft. and requires full sun, good drainage and occasional water once established. Like many other Australian shrubs, top growth can outstrip root development, so watch for wind-rock. Hardy to 20-25°.

7. *Billbergia sanderiana*, *Aechmea cylindrata* x *recurvata*, *Neoregelia* x 'Charm'

BROMELIACEAE

David Feix, Berkeley

David grows all three of these outdoors in the ground in Berkeley, but suggests that most would increase more readily in containers in a freely-draining mix. The *Billbergia* sports hot-pink bracts between which the flowers emerge and suffers top damage at 28°. It is not readily available. The *Aechmea* had blue flowers and the *Neoregelia* was flushed bright red at the centers of the rosettes.

8. *Rhododendron dielsianum* (?)

ERICACEAE

Katherine Henwood, Pacifica

This and the following specimen are *Vireya* (tropical) rhododendrons, which Katherine grows in pots outdoors in a fast-draining mix. Epiphytic in the wild, these prefer to be in relatively small pots in part shade, kept moist but not soggy. This species has small pink flowers.

9. *Rhododendron macgregoriae* x *aurigeranum*

ERICACEAE

Katherine Henwood, Pacifica

Larger and lankier than the last, with showy soft orange flowers. The two parent species are from Papua New Guinea and one (*aurigeranum*) grows at 10,000 ft elevation where night time temperatures drop below 40°.

10. (?) *Pleurothallus restrepioides* 'Dragonstone'

ORCHIDACEAE

Katherine Henwood, Pacifica

This was brought in for identification. It finally bloomed after being shunted around for years. ✨

HORT NOTES:

■ **OPEN GARDEN**—Come support new members Melanie Olstad and Dan Carlson of Wigglestem Gardens as they open the gates to one of their most horticulturally diverse and environmentally challenged gardens. This dynamic garden will be part of the Garden Conservancy Open Days Tour on Sunday May 5th from 10 AM-4PM. The garden is located in San Francisco at 75 Elmira Street. The cross street is Industrial off of Bayshore Boulevard near Floorcraft Nursery.

The garden is at the base of a 20 foot, natural rock outcropping. A combination of strong sun, poor, rocky soil, and wind inspired the use of many South African natives, lots of succulents, grasses, and other perennials. The client is a metal

sculptor/fabricator, so there is an industrial element to this rugged and natural setting. Varying microclimates within the garden have facilitated a diverse plant pallet.

■ **NEW PUBLIC GARDEN**—Splash Pad Park, in Oakland's Grand Lake Neighborhood just across the street from the Grand Lake Theatre, is about to get a major facelift. The city has hired landscape architect, Walter Hood, to design improvements and construction is to begin later this year. One proposed feature of the new park is a very large planting bed to be filled with hardy perennials...most likely California natives. The architects plans are posted online at <http://www.oaklandpw.com/splashpad/index.htm>.

In view of their current difficulties in providing adequate park maintenance, the city's Park and Recreation Department may, however, require a substantial reduction in the size of the proposed bed. As another option, the Splash Pad Neighborhood Forum is hoping to enlist an organization or group of individuals who are willing to adopt the bed and help provide ongoing maintenance. Hood Design would also be very interested in plant donations to help further stretch the funds budgeted for this project.
