## Plant of the Month by Josh Schechtel

Agapetes serpens
Family: ERICACEAE

In Greek, "agapetos" means "beloved", and that summarizes my relationship with this plant. Actually, for many years, it was "beloved from afar", since I had trouble finding one for sale. It is now more available, especially at botanical garden plant sales. "Serpens" is from the Latin for snake or serpent. This probably refers to the creeping growth habit of this plant in the wild, snaking along the branches of trees. Growing naturally as an epiphyte in Nepal, Bhutan and India at elevations from 1500-3000 meters, Agapetes can withstand some cold, and even light frosts. Agapetes produces reddish new stems and leaves from a large, caudex-like base. The leaves get greener in shaded locations, but will stay reddish with more sunlight. Be careful though. It can burn in full inland sun. The branches form long arches up to five feet long, creating a very architectural presence. Agapetes looks especially good in a container at eye level, with its branches cascading down. The lantern-like flowers start to appear in February or March, and last through the spring. They are fairly small, and

have a beautiful chevron pattern on them. A raised container makes them easier to see and appreciate. In thinking about the cultural requirements for *Agapetes*, it helps to remember that it is in the Erica family, so it likes slightly acidic soil with moderate watering and reasonable drainage. In return, it will brighten your late winter garden with wonderful mini-lanterns of color.
