

Plant of the Month by Josh Schechtel

Holodiscus discolor, Ocean Spray Family: Rosaceae

Holodiscus discolor is usually called Ocean Spray or Cream Bush, although at one time it was called California Spiraea. I find this amusing, since it is such a common plant in the native forests of the Pacific Northwest. I can just see them now: "Oh, the arrogance of those Californians, claiming everything as their own...." This deciduous woody shrub gets to 15 feet high in its ideal natural habitats, but usually remains less than seven feet high in the garden. Growing best in partial shade, in almost any type of soil, it develops pretty, lobed leaves in the spring, followed from May to July by wonderful panicles of frothy white flowers, which fade over the summer to tan and then to brown. It is attractive to native birds and butterflies. The flowers have a nice scent, although some have described the smell up close to be like that of old newspapers. I've never been aware of this similarity, but then again, I recycle my newspapers before they get old.

Native Americans put this plant to many uses, including using the flowers as an antidiarrheal remedy and the strong wood for spears, arrows, and

nails. The fruits were used as a treatment for smallpox and chickenpox, the seeds as a blood purifier, and the leaves were used as a poultice.

Although it is not in bloom at this time of year, this is the beginning of our planting season, especially for native plants. If you are thinking about trying this plant in your garden, the next two to three months are the ideal time to get it in the ground.
