What We Sow

with **Jennifer Jewell**, gardener, author, producer, award-winning podcaster of Cultivating Place

Jennifer will be speaking about her new book "What we Sow" on the personal, ecological, and cultural significance of seeds. She focuses on why gardening matters. What We Sow takes readers on an insightful, year-long journey exploring the outsize impact of one of nature's smallest manifestations—the simple seed. Jennifer examines our skewed notions to where "organic" seeds are grown and sourced, reveals how giant multinational agribusiness has refined and patented the genomes of seeds we rely on for staples like corn and soy, and highlights the efforts of activists working to regain legal access to heirloom seeds that were stolen from Indigenous peoples and people of color.

Jennifer's weekly public radio podcast, *Cultivating Place: Conversations on Natural History and the Human Impulse to Garden* looks at gardens and gardening as integral to our natural and cultural literacy. It is a co-production of North State Public Radio (KCHO 91.7 FM in Chico, CA and KFPR 88.9 FM in Redding, CA) and <u>Jewellgarden</u> (www.cultivatingplace.com).

Begonia fusca, San Francisco Botanical Garden collection Submitted by Jeff Harter. San Francisco

"A terrific begonia in the cloud forest garden. This one is intriguing to me because although I have a *fusca* in my yard this one has a very nice varigation on its leaves. It's just beautiful and quite different from the more solid green of the fusca example I have in my garden." The leaves are about two feet wide.



Geissorhiza inaequalis (South African Cape) & Erythronium helenae (St. Helena Fawn Lily – endemic / rare) Submitted by Mary Sue Ittner, Gualala

"G. inaequalis is a bit weedy as it not only seeds itself about, but also has tiny cormlets around the main corm that seem to make their way into a number of pots if I ever reuse soil I've sterilized. The Geissorhiza isn't replacing anything and soon will disappear and sometimes makes for interesting contrasts with other bulbs. I have a couple of Erythronium in flower. In my raised beds I often end up with more than one bulb in a pot. Sometimes that is planned, and other times bulbs and other things make their way into the pots and create surprising combinations, some pleasing, but not always."



Tulipa linifolia (Batalinii Group)

"I grow a number of *Tulipa* species in pots, unpotted when dormant and left in paper bags, and then prechilled for six weeks and planted in December. Some of these may not need so much chilling and I'm experimenting with some in containers sunk into other containers in a raised bed and not repotted every year. What was known as *Tulipa linifolia* and may still be sold under that name is now included in *Tulipa batalinii*."



Exochorda x macrantha 'Pearlbush'

"This is an *Exochorda* that I got at a Cal Hort meeting about 30 years ago. I think it was in a 4" pot and I won it in the plant drawing. It started out in the middle of my yard —ended up too big, and I moved a couple of the offshoots to the area along my fence about six to eight years ago. This is one of those in bloom. It is easy to grow in sun to partial shade (it is in part shade in my yard) and prefers well-drained, acidic soil, although it does well in more average soil. I would say my soil is average."


